What a year it's been, culminating in the recent sod turning event on the expansion site. Together, with our students, the Deputy Premier, and the Education Minister, we officially marked the start of the expansion building works. So, while the

school year is winding down, the building expansion works is ramping up!

The expansion will enable WESS to accommodate up to 1,725 students by 2022. The winning tenderer for Stage 1 is Hutchinson Builders (Hutchies) and they will be busy on site over the Christmas holidays. They will turn our school community's vision into a WESS expansion! Over the holidays, Hutchies will demolish the Queensland Police building and lay the groundwork for the new buildings for Stage 1. In late January, the building slab will be poured, and we'll get to see the footprint of the three-storey early years' classroom block, which is all part of Stage 1. I am very excited that Cox Architecture has been retained for Stage 1 as this will give us continuity in design. See below for a graphic capturing the community consultation processes used to help shape the expansion.

I'm looking forward to the outdoor and flexible spaces planned as part of the building, as it will empower the students to achieve their personal best! We have been working hard and researching to ensure we make the most of these spaces and enhance student learning.

WESS expansion is an extension of our school with the "campus heart" of WESS located where Horan St was. It is the same school, just bigger; and our students will wear the same uniforms and be taught by the same teachers. It is all still WESS!!

Next year will see us reach around 1,200 students and we have meticulously planned their placement in classrooms. We have had to resurrect some double teaching spaces, which we used for individual classes this year. We have worked hard to facilitate teaching teams in these spaces who have a passion for cooperative teaching.

Early 2020, we'll also launch our new four-year strategic plan. While the WESS expansion master plan has shaped our physical presence, our strategic plan will shape our community and learning culture. We have used the WESS vision and values,



developed with our school community, as the foundation for the strategic plan. We have embedded feedback received from you all over the past year through surveys, discussions, and consultations including the master planning consultation and input from the School Council. We have also included the feedback received from the recent School Review as well as the latest educational research. The strategic plan is really shaping up to be something we can be proud of and I am excited to share it with you all in the new year.



Meet the builder—Ian Partridge, Contractor Site Manager, Hutchison Builders.

"West End is full of character and Brisbane charm—it's a fun place to be. Hutchies has a long history in West End. We have worked on lots of the local landmarks for many decades. In the 1940s Hutchies built an expansion for what was originally the Thomas Dixon shoe factory on Montague Road and now, almost 80 years later, we are back on site doing early works for Queensland Ballet's new home, which will be known as the Thomas Dixon Centre. Hutchies has worked with the Department of Education for more than a century after building the original Bulimba State School back in 1914.

The original WESS building was built almost 150 years ago and is a local heritage landmark. Old establishments like this are full of great memories for people and they are an important part of our city. It is exciting to be a part of building this historic school's future learning facilities that will teach generations.

I'm keen to see the brick detailing on the face of the Stage 1 building—it will be a real head turner when it's finished. The overall selection of materials and colours will fit in very nicely to West End's heritage and character. The landscaped outdoor areas are really welcoming and practical.

The classrooms and teaching spaces will be open, modern and collaborative—they connect and interact with each

other well."

Stage 1 of the expansion —Prep & Year 1 rooms ready for Term 4, 2020

Stage 1 will deliver a three-storey learning centre including:

- 16 general learning areas
- Outdoor landscaped areas
- A new pick-up and drop-off zone.

OSHC expansion delay

WESS P&C decided to delay the planned expansion works that were scheduled over the Christmas break. These will now occur during the Easter school holiday period. A new tender will be called in January with the building contract awarded early in the new year.

"The Christmas premium builders were charging meant that we weren't going to get the best value for our fundraising dollars. We also found the tight deadlines were a problem. Outside School Hours Care (OSHC) will start the year with 190 places for families needing help bridging the gap between school hours and working hours.

We are pleased to be able to offer this service and continue to support WESS families.
