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Academic & Student Leadership Awards

At West End State School, we are dedicated to recognising and celebrating the academic excellence, character development, and leadership qualities of our students.

The Annual Awards Presentation, held at the end of each school year, is a significant event that allows our school community to come together in acknowledging the hard work, growth, and achievements of our students.

This event is not only a public celebration of learning but also an affirmation of the values and standards we uphold as a school. Through these awards, we aim to inspire all students to strive for excellence and to embody the school values of challenge, confidence, compassion, creativity and community. In addition to the specific criteria for each award, all recipients must meet the following school standards:

- Students consistently demonstrate the school's three key expectations: being Ready, Kind, and Safe.
- Students maintain a minimum attendance rate of 90% for the year (excluding absences due to significant medical conditions or family event).
- Award recipients must have been enrolled at WESS for at least one semester.

This document provides a comprehensive list of the awards presented at the Annual Awards Presentation and outlines the criteria for selecting the nominees and recipients.

Nominations and Selection Process

- □ The Year Level Deputy Principal, Middle Leaders, and teaching teams collaborate to determine nominations and select award recipients.
- Year level teams may nominate one student from their class based on the award criteria. However, multiple nominations from a class may be submitted based on the criteria, while some classes may have no nominations. This may be common across academic awards.
- □ For a nomination to be considered, the student's name must be recorded on the nomination sheet along with supporting evidence and relevant data.
- □ The Deputy Principal and year level team review all nominations and selects one winner for each category. If two students are equally deserving, and cannot be split, both will receive the award.
- □ The overall winner is confirmed by the Executive Leadership Team.
- □ Verify the correct spelling of both the first and last name of each student (*provide the phonetic pronunciation of the student's name*).
- Upload a photo of each class nominee into the designated folder on <u>0212 Staff Team | WESS AWARDS Term 4 |</u> <u>Microsoft Teams</u>.

Consistently shows effort and perseverance in overcoming challenges, maintaining a positive attitude towards learning and personal development.
 Makes notable progress towards personal goals and objectives as outlined in their Individualised Learning Plan, reflecting their dedication and hard work. Contributes to creating an inclusive and supportive school environment, fostering a caring attitude and enhancing a sense of belonging for themselves and others.
Selected based on nominations from the classroom teachers in consultation with the specialist teachers:
 Notable contributions to the ethos of the school. An attendance rate of 95% or higher. Actively contributes to the life and culture of the school. Consistently adheres to school expectations. Participates in various school activities and events, including sport and the arts. Achieves consistently good academic results. Demonstrates positive role modelling for peers. Exemplifies the school values in their attitude and behaviour. No major office incident referrals throughout the school year.

Recipients must have achieved no less than a "C" in all Key Learning Areas. Demonstrated consistent participation, effort, and a positive attitude towards learning and daily work.

Years 3-6 only

AWARDS	Nomination and selection of candidates are based on the following criteria:	
Heart of the Community Spirit and Service Award (Years 3 – 6)	Demonstrates consistent participation in community service activities, school events, or volunteer work, showing a commitment to making a positive difference.	
	Takes the initiative to lead or organise community service projects or activities, inspiring others to get involved and contribute.	
	Exhibits a positive and enthusiastic attitude towards service and community engagement, contributing to a supportive and encouraging environment.

AWARD	Nomination and selection of candidates are based on the following criteria:	
Language Mastery Award (Years 5-6)	 One student nominated by each language teacher. Demonstrates exceptional proficiency and growth in language skills, including reading, writing, speaking, and listening, including Levels of Achievement (A - E) from Semester 1 and 2 reporting. Engages actively and contributes positively in language-related activities and class discussions. Shows a strong commitment to learning, with a positive attitude and significant effort towards language development.

AWARDS	Nomination and selection of candidates are based on the following criteria:
	This award recognises a student who excels across six key categories. Nominations are made by students and shortlisted based on the criteria below, and the recipient is the student who receives the most votes from their peers.
	Consistently demonstrates a positive, selfless attitude and is always willing to help others.
	Exhibits exemplary behaviour at all times, consistently going above and beyond expectations.
Star Peer Allrounder Award	□ Serves as a role model for peers, leading by example through actions and behaviour.
(Year 6)	Actively participates in both school and community activities, contributing fully to the life of the school.
	Represents the school in sporting activities, displaying commitment and team spirit regardless of their level of skill or achievement.
	Engages enthusiastically in the cultural and artistic life of the school, demonstrating passion and creativity.
	Nominations are nominated by students and shortlisted by the Year 6 teachers. The recipient is the student who receives the most votes from their peers.

AWARDS	Nomination and selection of candidates are based on the following criteria:
Academic Dux (Year 6)	 The Year 6 Dux Academic Medal is a prestigious award presented to the student who demonstrates outstanding academic achievement across key learning areas throughout the school year. This award recognizes the student who attains the highest combined score in English, Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Social Sciences (HASS), Health and Physical Education (HPE), and Languages. The final score is determined by weighting key learning areas, with additional emphasis placed on English and Mathematics due to their core significance. The recipient consistently displays outstanding dedication, persistence, and commitment to learning, regularly going above and beyond in their academic pursuits. In the event of a tie, additional considerations may include year-level assessments, diagnostic tests, "High Achievers" initiatives and standardised assessments to ensure a comprehensive evaluation. If the tie persists, dual Dux Awards will be presented. The final decision regarding the Dux Academic Medal recipient(s) rests with the Executive Leadership Team.

Review

The School Council in conjunction with the Executive Leadership Team will review the Academic and Student Leadership Awards every four years, or when Queensland Department of Education amends relevant policy.
